CONVERSATIONS TO HAVE

BEFORE BECOMING A STERLING COLLEGE STUDENT

Based on a combination of many years' experience and feedback from our students, we have compiled a list of everyday activities that new students should discuss and practice with family and mentors prior to arriving at Sterling College:

FINANCIAL LIMITATIONS

Know what your financial package covers (The Financial Aid Office may award students with federal work study as part of the student's financial aid package. **Federal work study** is a need-based program), what family support you might receive and what the student is responsible for. Talk to your student about what his or her financial responsibilities should be, whether it is working a part-time job, applying for financial aid, or taking out a student loan. Managing money, balancing a checking account, living within a budget, the hazards of credit card debt and the accessibility of credit are important topics to cover.

PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY

Lock car and residence hall doors when you leave. Don't keep items out in the open unattended. Do not bring irreplaceable items to college.

MANAGING CONFLICT

Learning how to express themselves with others and solve their own problems while away at school is invaluable. Negotiating roommate conflict, disagreements on group projects and respectfully vocalizing your opinion are learned skills that our staff is available to help with. College students are held responsible for their behavior and decisions, which may be uncomfortable at first. When your student calls you with concerns on campus, how will you help them respond to the issue themselves?

PERSONAL HYGIENE

Maintaining a clean and healthy, shared living environment is an expectation of each student. Students should know how to do laundry, clean a bathroom, keep up with dirty dishes, change bed sheets, maintain personal cleanliness, etc.

PROFESSIONAL COMMUNICATION

Learning etiquette for calling or emailing a professor, adviser, coach, or administrator will serve students well. The appropriate way to address and format communication with staff communicates a positive image of the student. Clear communication in a voicemail or email is practice for post-college careers.

LIVING WELL WITH OTHERS

Having a new roommate(s) can be an adjustment for many students. Encouraging your student to contact their new roommate(s) before arrival can be a great way to ease into the transition. Start discussing class schedules, cleanliness, study habits, and items each wants to bring to the room. Learning, living, and working with people from different backgrounds is one of the best learning experiences students will have at college.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Students are responsible for their own learning. What study habits has your student already developed? What needs does your student have? Is the college aware of any support needs? Admitting a need for help can be tough for students, especially those who may not have struggled academically before college. Visiting office hours and building relationships with faculty early will help.

GETTING CONNECTED

Host families, churches, activities/athletics, clubs, etc.

TIME MANAGEMENT

With time in-between classes and new distractions in college, think through a realistic schedule ahead of time. Scheduling time for studying, campus activities, outside interests and family obligations can help reduce stress and improve academic success.

INFORMATION PRIVACY

If your student is over 18, their education records are protected by the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). Begin discussing whether your student would like to sign a FERPA waiver granting you access to this information. FACULTY INFORMATION

Faculty at Sterling College want to build a positive relationship with your student. Encourage them to utilize office hours and meet with their professors if they are struggling in class. Regular communication with Faculty help them to help students.



ACADEMICS

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY

Academic integrity is a cornerstone of teaching and learning at Sterling College. It is expected that all members of the College community will uphold high intellectual and ethical standards. It is the responsibility of students to protect their own work from inappropriate use by others and to protect the work of other people by properly citing the sources of references and ideas. It is the responsibility of students to ensure that examinations are completed with integrity and all work for a course is completed honestly.

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, plagiarism and cheating. Plagiarism is the use of another's words or ideas, verbatim or paraphrased, consciously or unconsciously, without giving credit to the creator of the work. Cheating is the unauthorized use or exchange of information before or during an examination, unauthorized collaboration on an assignment, submitting the same work for more than one course, or buying or selling work for a course. Similarly, it is cheating to conspire to do any of the above or to aid or assist those who do. Full details of policy included in Academic Catalog.

CATALOG

Specific information regarding academic policies and requirements is contained in the Academic Catalog. It is the responsibility of the student to fulfill all requirements as stated in the catalog. The College reserves the right to change policies at any time when such changes are necessary. CLASS ATTENDANCE

Regular class attendance is expected of all students. Individual instructors will establish the attendance policy for their own courses. Students should contact the instructor as soon as a need for an absence becomes apparent. Health issues must be excused through the Office of the Academic Dean, Office of Student Life, or a physician's office. Make-up work for all unexcused absences is at the discretion of the instructor of the class. Faculty members will allow excused absences for all students involved in college-approved activities and events and accommodate the students by offering them opportunities, without penalty, to either make up the work or do work ahead of time to meet course requirements.



ACADEMIC ADVISING

Each full-time student is assigned a faculty member to assist with schedule planning and monitoring academic progress. While the faculty adviser will be assisting the student to plan for degree completion, it is the responsibility of the student to confirm that all requirements are met.

A change in your student's academic major may warrant a change in advisers. If your student desires to declare/change their major, the required form may be obtained from the Office of the Registrar. Until their major is officially declared with the Office of the Registrar by the completion of the form, their adviser will be the faculty who assisted them with their initial SC enrollment. Our Office of the Registrar is in Kelsey Hall.

CAMPUS LIFE

THE ARTS AT STERLING COLLEGE

Our students are involved in the Arts at Sterling College. All the Arts programs are open to all Sterling College students regardless of major or other activity interests. The Arts bring life and excitement to campus.

THEATRE

SC Theatre has a long history of producing five to nine quality theatre productions each year. Each season includes two musicals when most colleges and even universities only produce one a year. Shakespeare and other classic plays as well as contemporary plays, children's theatre, and one-acts are also included. Sterling students and faculty design and construct all costumes, sets, lights as well as hair and make-up - all theatrical elements for every show. Auditions and technical opportunities are open to all students regardless of major. Watch for campus announcements about auditions.

MUSIC

SC Music offers a full Concert Choir, a select vocal ensemble known as Highland Singers, a Women's Choir, Men's Choir, as well as Symphonic Band, and various instrument ensembles including Pep Band, Jazz Band, and drum line. Music groups tour each year around the region as well as longer spring break tours to places like Alaska, Colorado, California, Illinois, and Texas, among others. The music department offers private lessons for voice and instruments for students of all levels and majors.

ART & DESIGN

The art scene is vibrant at Sterling. With coursework in graphic design, digital painting, traditional painting, photography and other visual arts, students of any major are encouraged to develop their artistic side. The Art & Design department also offers education outside of classroom through collaborated exhibitions, field trips, workshops, and community projects. The Art Center provides students with studio and gallery space to create and exhibit their work.

WORSHIP ARTS

At Sterling College, students are invited to participate as members of the worship team and technical crew who serve as the production team for our campus chapel services. In addition, the worship team travels off-campus to lead worship

and build relationships with high schools and church youth groups. There is one degree path which provides formal training and education for students who are interested in pursuing a career in worship music and leadership: the Bachelor of Arts in Christian Ministry - Worship Arts Concentration

COMMUNICATION/MEDIA ARTS

Communication/Media students work on multiple projects including the online campus newsletter, The Sterling College Online Observer Publication (SCOOP), the Sterling College Online Radio (SCOR), and original podcasts and material for the radio station. In addition, students acquire hands-on, real-world experience in public relations and social media. The department is excited to implement the new Sports Media Communication program. This program is geared towards students wanting to build a career in the sports media industry. Students interested in learning more about the programs in this department, or getting involved, are invited to stop by the Art & Media Center or reach out to Prof. Todd Vogts or Prof. Holly Schmidt.

FORENSICS/DEBATE

Sterling boasts one of the most successful intercollegiate forensics/debate teams in the country. The Debate Team has been ranked in the top 25 programs eight times in recent years as well as having the top speaker in the nation in 2018. There is a space on the team for both the experienced and inexperienced, whether in debate, speaking or interpretive events. The SC Debate/Forensics team travels extensively across the country for competition.

DINING SERVICES

CHOOSE YOUR 2023-2024 MEAL PLAN

Sterling College partners with Chartwells Higher Education Dining Services for campus dining service. Each student residing on campus is required to have a meal plan. Students will use their student ID to swipe in for each meal. There are three options for resident meal plans, each with a limited number of swipes.

- Our first-year students can choose from our 200-block meal plan and our 300-block meal plan, first-year students are not eligible for the 150-block meal plan. In addition, returning students and transfer students also have the option of choosing a 150-block meal plan.
- The 150-block plan should be especially attractive to students who are off campus most of the day to complete internships.
- We strongly encourage our student-athletes to choose the 200-block or 300-block meal plan.

We also offer "market money" for each meal plan. The market is simply credit that allows students to purchase items. Market

SAFETY AND EMERGENCIES

ON CAMPUS

Sterling College strives to provide a safe and secure environment for its students, employees, and visitors. While instances of criminal activity on campus have been infrequent, Sterling College is not immune to the criminal elements that affect society. The College benefits from a community whose members truly care about one another. By watching and remaining alert to our surroundings, we can work together to help preserve an educational environment that is conducive to learning and growing. Please contact the Office of Student Life or other appropriate campus personnel if your son or daughter has any safety concerns or you have questions or suggestions regarding campus safety.

STUDENT ID

Students are given a picture ID card at registration. Lost or broken ID cards can be replaced in the Student Life Office. Lost cards can be purchased for \$15 cash or \$20 if the charge is added to your student's account. In the interest of campus safety, students are required to always carry their student ID with them. Student ID cards act as your student's meal card and key to the residence hall. Students are given card access to their residence hall and necessary buildings ONLY. Limiting door access allows us to ensure the safety of our resident students. ID cards are also used for checking out purposes in the library.

E2CAMPUS ALERTS

Should there be a campus emergency, your student will receive notification through e2campus omnalert, our emergency alert system. They will receive both an email, text message, and an app alert about the nature of the emergency and instructions about how to stay safe. All students will sign up for e2campus as part of the registration process for the semester. If your student does not receive e2campus alerts, encourage him or her to contact the Office of Student Life right away.

MARKING AND INVENTORY OF PERSONAL PROPERTY

Students are encouraged to permanently mark and inventory all personal property. Students are asked to write down the serial numbers of all expensive or technical items on a property identification form, which can be obtained in the Office of Student Life. This form should be returned to the Office of Student Life, and the student should keep a copy in a safe place. In the event of property loss, this form can be used to provide proof of ownership so the property can be returned or replaced by the police or insurance company. It is a good idea to review your homeowner's insurance policy and determine if your student's belongings will be covered at school under your policy. If your homeowner's insurance does not cover these belongings, renter's insurance may be purchased from many different companies for a minimal fee.

ON-CAMPUS SECURITY

Staff are available in the residence halls through the evening hours in case of emergency. A professional, live-in resident director is on-call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, while classes are in session. During office hours, 8 a.m.–5 p.m., Monday – Friday, please contact the Office of Student Life at 620-278-4232. After hours, students are encouraged to contact their housing staff with concerns and emergencies.

The Sterling Police Department patrol grounds and buildings every evening and throughout the night. The Sterling Police assures proper lock-up of campus buildings and general well-being of students during the night. A Daily Crime Log is maintained in the Office of Student Life. The crime log contains criminal incidents and alleged criminal incidents that are reported to the Office of Student Life. Students and employees are encouraged to report incidents/crimes to the Office of Student Life. Any individual may obtain a copy by coming to the Office of Student Life or calling 620-278-4232.

PARKING ON CAMPUS

Parking on campus is included in student fees for the 2023-2024 year. Permits must be displayed while vehicles are on the property. Students may pick up their parking permits at Orientation or in the Student Life Office. Students should avoid parking in areas painted yellow, red, or blue to avoid parking tickets or parking fines.

FIRE SAFETY

It is important for students to follow residence hall guidelines and safe practices to avoid fire hazards. Fire drills are conducted each semester for each hall. Regular safety checks are also performed by the Resident directors. It is important for students to be aware of and follow emergency preparedness plans.

RESIDENTIAL LIFE

RESIDENT EDUCATION DIRECTORS

A Resident Director (RD) is a full-time professional staff member living in the residence halls. It is their responsibility to manage the operation of the halls, train and supervise resident assistants, enforce policies, coordinate programming, provide crisis response, and counsel students. It is their role to develop a comfortable and productive living environment, serving as a resource to students.

RESIDENT ASSISTANTS

A Resident Assistant (RA) is a student staff member assigned to each floor or wing. These upperclassmen have been carefully selected and trained to coordinate and assist a floor or a wing of a residence hall. They are an excellent source of information regarding both personal and college-related matters. The RAs are responsible for creating a floor community, providing a variety of social and developmental programming, and enforcing policies and procedures. The RA is a personal liaison between the College community and the residence hall student. If your student has an issue, please encourage them to communicate with their RA. The RAs are here to help you in any way possible.

HOUSEKEEPING

Each hall has its own housekeeping team. The housekeeper assigned to your hall is responsible for cleaning the bathrooms, hallways, and other common areas. In residence halls that have in-room bathrooms, residents are responsible for cleaning their own space and housekeeping will clean common areas.

MAINTENANCE STAFF

A team of personnel performs maintenance in the residence halls in both common areas and individual rooms. Each member of the team has trade specialties but performs maintenance duties in a variety of areas. A member of the Maintenance team is on call after-hours and on the weekends for comfort, safety, and security issues. Both the housekeepers and the maintenance personnel have lead supervisors who direct their efforts.

STAFF ON CALL

There is always an RD on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week for emergencies.

ROOM ASSIGNMENTS

Room assignments for new students are made by the Student Life Office based on information requested on the housing questionnaire and the availability of space. Choices for returning students are made in the spring during Room Rush. Whenever possible, first choice is granted to those students remaining in the same room; then requests are considered in the order of achieved credit hours.

AMENITIES

Each hall is equipped with a Kitchenette & Laundry facility. Hall lobby, kitchenette & laundry are shared spaces. Laundry is covered in the Housing fee for Residential Students. Each room has select furniture that must remain in the room. More information about Hall amenities and room dimensions can be found at www.sterling.edu/student-life/housing

HALL VISITATION

Visitation between residence halls of the opposite gender is allowed during visitation hours. No in room visitation is permitted on Mondays. When visiting the room of a member of the opposite gender, the host/hostess must keep the door propped open while the guest is present.

RESIDENCE HALL RESTROOMS

Restrooms on the floors are to be used by the gender of the residents assigned to that floor only. Anyone of the opposite gender should use the designated guest restroom in the hall.

HOUSING WHEN CAMPUS IS CLOSED

Residence Halls close for major breaks. **Please have travel arrangements made prior to end of semester for those who are traveling back home during major breaks.** For select breaks, such as Spring Break or Thanksgiving Break, students who are unable to go home can get approval to remain on campus prior to the start of the break. Applications for staying over those breaks will be sent out via email. All on-campus food services are closed during major campus breaks.

SERVICES OFFERED

- Pre-scheduled appointments are available when appropriate.
- Walk-in visits for general health or wellness concerns.
- TB skin tests, maintenance allergy shots, other maintenance injections.
- Equipment Loans: crutches, slings, heating pads, vaporizers.
- Health Services will work with a student’s family doctor with approval of our Medical Consultant.
- Referral of students as needed or requested to local health care centers, Emergency Room, and local specialists.
- With a few exceptions, treatment is free to all Sterling College students.

VACCINATION RECOMMENDATIONS

- The Centers for Disease Control and American College Health Association recommend that young adults consider the following immunizations or screenings listed on the CDC website before entering college: <https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/imz-managers/coverage/teenvaxview/groups/college.html>
- These vaccines/tests can be obtained from your local physician or health department.
- Under vaccinated students may be excluded from international mission trips due to increased risk. Under vaccinated students may also be excluded from campus housing activities or class in case of an outbreak of that virus.
- Official immunization records are required as proof of immunization.

VACCINATION REQUIREMENTS

- Kansas now requires all incoming students residing in student housing to be vaccinated for meningococcal disease. Students must have a meningococcal conjugate or MenACWY vaccine at age 16 or later or the student must sign a waiver declining the vaccine. TB SCREENING - REQUIRED FOR NEW STUDENTS

- All newly admitted Sterling College students are required by Kansas Statute 65-129e to complete a TB questionnaire before attending class at Sterling College to aid in prevention and control of Tuberculosis.

- The cost of any additional testing is the responsibility of the student.

COUNSELING SERVICES

College students are at a stage of development which creates predictable pressures in relationships, mental health, personal identity, purpose, spirituality, and character. It is a time of hard work - personal, spiritual, academic, and relational. It is also a time in which mental health challenges may become evident. Statistics indicate that 75% of lifetime mental health conditions first occur before the age of 24. The earlier these are addressed the greater the likelihood of enhancing the quality of life and decreasing their negative effects.

When a student desires to reach out, there are a variety of different options available for counseling: Clinical Therapists, Life Coaching, and Discipleship/Mentoring. Counseling

Services are located in Kelsey Hall, and counseling sessions are free for SC students. Information shared in the counseling relationship will be considered confidential. No information will be released to anyone within the College or outside of it without the student's permission, unless there is an immediate or imminent threat of personal harm to self or another person, if there is a report of ongoing abuse to a minor, or if the student is under 18.

SPIRITUAL LIFE

Part of our mission at Sterling College is to ensure that our students “understand a maturing Christian faith.” While we accomplish this portion of our mission in several ways, the formal Spiritual Life Department plays an integral role in the process. Led by our Campus Pastor, the office seeks to develop and implement a creative and flexible spiritual formation program that meets the diverse spiritual needs that exist across our student body. By offering a variety of occasions for Christ-centered worship, study, and service, we hope students will find ways to meaningfully explore, engage, and grow in their faith. Some opportunities within our spiritual formation program include:

CHAPEL

One chapel service is held each week on Wednesday mornings, which feature speakers from both the campus community as well as from churches and ministries from around the country. Most chapel services also include a time of musical worship led by our student chapel band, Pursuit. In addition to Wednesday chapel services, a specific hour on Friday mornings is reserved for Bible studies and prayer groups. Full-time on campus students are required to obtain at least 18 attendance credits each semester. Full-time off campus students are required to obtain at least 13 attendance credits, while part-time and online students are welcomed, but have no requirements. Each chapel generally counts for one attendance credit.

CONVOCATIONS

With more of an academic focus than chapel services, convocations are held one to three times each semester with varied emphases. Convocations always count for two attendance credits for students who have the requirements listed above.

SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS WEEK

One week is set aside each school year to delve deeply into a specific topic/theme. Speakers with extensive knowledge of or experience in the focus for the week are invited onto campus to share in various settings.

ONLINE ENGAGEMENT

Chapel sermons are posted online, as is a Spotify playlist of songs used during worship.

PASTORAL CARE

Our Campus Pastor meets frequently with students on any number of topics and is eager to support the student body as much as he can in this way.

FINANCIAL AID

You may file the FAFSA online and request an FSA ID (used as your electronic signature) at fafsa.ed.gov. After you have submitted your FAFSA, the federal processor will electronically transmit your information to all colleges listed on the form. If you have included the Sterling College school code (001945), we will automatically receive a summary of the information you reported on the FAFSA. Students must apply for financial aid annually.

The yearly fee is \$75.00 and semester fee is \$50.00.

PLAN THREE

Pay net amount using any Alternative Loan or Parent Plus loan. All paperwork must be received in the Financial Aid Office by August 1st for fall or January 1st for spring. **THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT!**

Failure to have all financial matters settled by the add/drop date each semester may lead to the inability to enroll in a subsequent semester. Students will not be allowed to take any future classes if their student account is on hold. Students must receive financial clearance from the Office of Student Accounts.

METHODS OF PAYMENT: Sterling College accepts Visa, MasterCard, Discover, American Express, check and cash, fees may apply.

All international students and those who are not eligible to file a FAFSA must have their fall semester balance paid by July 15th and spring semester balance paid by December 15th. Classes will be dropped if the deadlines are not met.

MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS

- Bookstore vouchers are available up to the amount of credit on the student's account. Credit balances are estimates!
- Refunds: Credit balances will be refunded to the student or to the parent (Plus Loan). Refunds cannot be issued until all financial aid has been received.
